We are still seeking nominations for officers. I hope some of you will consider running for DNB office. Please contact me with ideas.

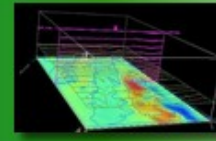

SICB 2010 in Seattle

A total of 1318 abstracts were submitted for the 2010 meeting, which makes it one of the largest SICB meetings ever. In the Division of Neurobiology, the number of abstracts is up from last year by about 30%. As in Boston, the posters will be spread across three days, in groups of 12-15. The contributed oral presentations are organized into two all-morning sessions on Monday and Tuesday. In addition, there are a number of other neuro-related presentations in other sessions.

As always, we need volunteers to act as judges for the Best Student Presentation awards! If you are willing, please contact one of



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the program officers. You can also very easily sign up for judging when you register on-line for the meeting.

The business meeting for DNB is scheduled for Monday afternoon January 4 at 5:15 p.m. We expect that meeting to be completed by 5:45 or so, and our social is scheduled to take place in the Sheraton hotel beginning at 6:00. We are hosting our social in conjunction with Animal Behavior, by which we hope to bring our related groups closer together.

Special Note: there will be a workshop on Wednesday, related to the Grand Challenges for Organismal Biology. These Grand Challenges were developed by SICB members during the past year. The National Science Foundation has taken interest in these and there is a prospect that NSF may reorganize its priorities with greater attention toward the importance of the organism in biological studies. To promote discussion of how the Grand Challenges may be implemented, the Executive Officers of SICB, and in particular Program Officer-Elect Brian Tsukimura, have organized this workshop to initiate discussions with the authors of the Grand Challenges papers (published in the last four issues of *Integrative & Comparative Biology*). There will also be officers from several external societies present to enhance the discussion. Societies that have agreed to participate are Sigma Xi, Ecological Society of America, Society for Developmental Biology, American Physiological Society, Animal Behavior Society, and American Soci-

ety for Cell Biology. We hope you will be able to attend this important event. The workshop will be held on Wednesday, January 6th, from noon to 3:00 p.m.

SICB 2011 in Salt Lake City

The two DNB-sponsored symposia proposed for SICB 2011 were approved by the SICB Program Committee at their meeting in Seattle on October 4th. The topics of the symposia are Neuroecology, organized by Charles Derby, and Neuronal Mechanisms of Central Pattern Generators, organized by Duane McPherson. This is good news for DNB and should make the 2011 meeting very attractive for neurobiologists. Please spread the word and continue to encourage your neuro-oriented colleagues to submit their abstracts to SICB.

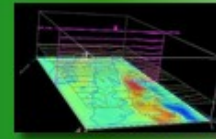
SICB 2012 in Charleston, S.C.
