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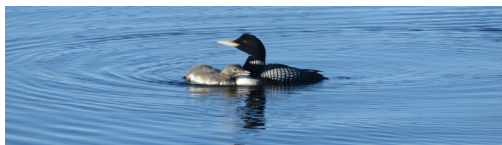

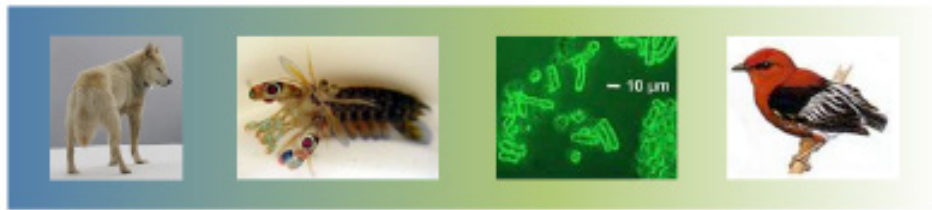

Upcoming Meeting Highlights – January 3-7, 2016, in Portland, OR

The SICB programming committee recently met to finalize the program for our upcoming Annual Meeting, to be held January 3-7 in Portland, OR. With almost 1650 abstracts submitted, we expect this to be another record-breaking year. Don't forget that presenters must [register](#) by November 5!

The meeting will be held at the Oregon Convention Center – one of the nation's "greenest" – with housing at a number of nearby hotels. Make [hotel reservations](#) early for the best selection and rates! Portland boasts one of the nation's top public transport systems. Included in your SICB registration is a [TriMet pass](#) valid on local trains, buses and streetcars for the duration of the conference, which you will receive upon check in at the SICB registration desk. For those arriving via air, the MAX Light Rail will get you from the airport to the downtown area for \$2.50. Child care will also be available at the meeting again this year. Animal behavior will have a very strong presence at the meeting, including:

- 102 oral presentations in 15 behaviorally-themed sessions
- 60 posters in behaviorally-themed poster sub-sessions
- 103 presentations in other sessions by authors with DAB primary affiliation or ABS affiliation
- 49 entrants in DAB Best Student Presentation competitions (oral and poster)

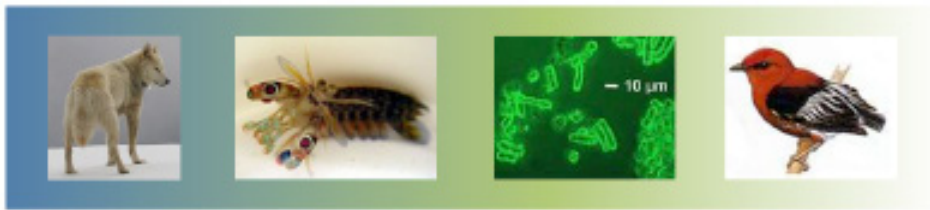

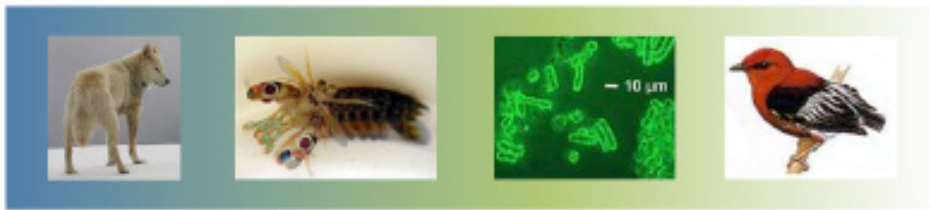

DAB Research Highlight

Marcus Thibodeau, MWSU graduate student, with live and model horned lizards

Matt Watson's Evolutionary Ecology and Physiology Laboratory at Midwestern State University in Wichita Falls, Texas, uses a 3D scanner and printer to make animal models for research on predator/prey interactions. Master's student Marcus Thibodeau, shown here, uses these models to



investigate the effects of quail management practices on horned lizard populations in North Texas. This project entails elements of digestive physiology, prey composition, thermal ecology, habitat composition, and conservation biology. The 3D printed model in the photograph, alongside the live horned lizard, is one of many used to establish operative lizard temperatures. The Watson lab is constantly looking for new applications of this technology. Look for Marcus' presentation in Portland for more information!
